WHEREAS, the body of work created by Wiley Price constitutes an irreplaceable historical archive that will continue to educate and inform future generations about the social, cultural, and civic life of St. Louis;

RESOLUTION NUMBER 221 HONORING HENRY GEORGE THOMPSON

WHEREAS, Henry George Thompson was born on June 21, 1945, in St. Louis was the son of Henry and Emma Lou Thompson, both of whom preceded him in death. Hank was one of eight siblings, Eddie D. Thompson, Jessie Frank Thompson, Arrutha D McIntyre (Jackson), Samuel Lee Thompson, Dennis Thompson, Margaret Thompson, and his beloved baby sister, Beverley L. Thompson. All of Hank’s sibling preceded him in death except Beverley, his last living sibling. Family was the foundation of Hank’s life, and those ties remained central to who he was until the very end; and

WHEREAS, Hank’s spiritual roots were planted at Kingsway Baptist Church under the leadership of Dr. Herman Dreer, where early lessons in service, reflection, and responsibility took hold. His education began at Riddick Elementary School and included attendance at several North St. Louis high schools before graduating from Vashon High School. He continued his studies at Northeast Missouri State University, now Truman State University, and later attended the University of Missouri–St. Louis and Saint Louis University; and

WHEREAS, Hank honorably served in the United States Air Force, spending time overseas, including extended work in Saudi Arabia. These experiences broadened his worldview, deepened his appreciation for culture, and strengthened his ability to connect with people from all walks of life; and

WHEREAS, inspired by the radio voices he heard growing up in St. Louis, particularly on KMOX, Hank found his calling in broadcasting. In 1982, he entered radio as an account executive at Magic 108. By the mid-1980s, he partnered with Robert Lawrence Salter, also known as Scotty Lawrence, and Al Hillman to co found the Salter & Thompson Advertising Agency, St. Louis' first minority owned advertising agency; and

WHEREAS, in 1985, Hank co launched Saturday Morning Live with Salter and Thompson, a groundbreaking weekly program that blended music, comedy, and conversation which intentionally targeted Black audiences on jazz radio stations including WMRY; and

WHEREAS, the program later evolved into Good Morning St. Louis, airing on KATZ and KXOK, and became a trusted platform for dialogue, culture, and community issues. In 1987, Hank led the successful restoration of public radio station KBDY 89.9 FM, serving as its General Manager until 1989. He later joined The St. Louis American newspaper and served in a variety of roles; and

WHEREAS, in 1993, Hank launched Good Morning St. Louis as a daily four-hour talk show, earning widespread recognition and national honors for journalistic excellence. Over the years, he continued producing and contributing to programming across multiple radio stations, including WGNU, KXLW, WXIN, WESL, WSIE, KDHX and the podcast, Tangazo. In 2005, Hank expanded into television, producing Voices for St. Louis Public Schools; and

WHEREAS, in 2008, he and his wife Sandra founded Thompson Home Health Team, building a respected home health service rooted in compassion, dignity, and care; and

WHEREAS, throughout his career, Hank was recognized for his impact and leadership. He was honored as a St. Louis Urban League Media Awardee and inducted into the National Black Radio Hall of Fame. He was also a proud member of the Black Journalists Association and the Gateway Boating Club; and

WHEREAS, outside of his professional work, Hank was an avid boater, his love of boating was so deep that he named his first boat after his mother, Emma Lou; and

WHEREAS, Hank took particular pride in his relationships with the government and political leadership of St. Louis. He had a very close relationship with both former Missouri Congressmen William "Bill" Clay and William "Lacy" Clay and Hank played an active role in the political careers of former St. Louis Comptroller Virvus Jones and former St. Louis Mayor Freeman Bosley, Jr (the first African American Mayor for the City of St. Louis), plus many, many more. Hank had the unique ability to reach out to political leadership throughout the country from California, to Minnesota, to Florida and have them participate on his programs. Hank was known and respected in those circles; and

WHEREAS, in his personal life, Hank experienced deep love and partnership. In 1971 he married Sonda Dixon, and from that union his son Christian Thompson was conceived. In 1989, Hank married the love of his

life, Sandra Burt, beginning a devoted partnership marked by resilience, shared purpose, and understanding. He was a proud husband, father, and grandfather; and

WHEREAS, Henry George Thompson peacefully transitioned on the evening of December 8, 2025. His voice, wisdom, and unwavering commitment to meaningful conversation leave an enduring imprint on the hearts of all who knew him, heard him, and loved him; and

WHEREAS, Hank leaves behind his devoted wife Sandra Thompson, his children Christian Thompson and Susan Thompson, his beloved bonus sons Darrel Dixon and David Samples (Carol), his grandchildren Christian, Dylan, Chase, Nick, Chris, and Jasper and his cherished sister Beverley L. Thompson, and a wide and loving circle of nieces, nephews, cousins, extended family members, colleagues, friends, and listeners from St. Louis and beyond. His life stands as a testament to the power of voice, community, and a life lived with intention.
