RESOLUTION NUMBER 23**URGING PRESIDENT TRUMP TO DEPLOY FEDERAL DISASTER RELIEF FUNDS TO THE ST. LOUIS REGION**

WHEREAS, on May 16, 2025, a powerful and destructive tornado struck the St. Louis region, damaging homes, displacing families, and devastating neighborhoods across the city and surrounding areas; and

WHEREAS, the storm inflicted both physical and emotional trauma, leaving residents without shelter, vital resources, and stability - requiring immediate intervention and sustained recovery efforts; and

WHEREAS, U.S. Senator Josh Hawley visited storm-impacted communities and described the destruction as “overwhelming,” stating he met with families who “lost everything - their homes, their memories, everything,” and called for urgent federal assistance; and

WHEREAS, U.S. Senator Eric Schmitt said, “My heart goes out to the families and loved ones of the deceased. My team has already been in touch with the White House and local leaders and stands ready, willing, and able to assist wherever possible.”; and

WHEREAS, U.S. Representative Wesley Bell visited storm-impacted communities and said, “...For the folks waking up to damage they can’t afford to fix. For the people still waiting on the lights to come back on. This is a heavy moment for our region, and we’re feeling it together...I want to thank our first responders, utility workers, and neighbors who jumped into action to help. My team has been in touch with local officials, state and federal partners, and we’re ready to do everything we can to support the response and the recovery.”; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Aldermen of the City of St. Louis stands united in its commitment to help affected residents recover, recognizing that swift and collaborative support is essential to rebuilding lives and restoring communities; and

WHEREAS, as shown by the bipartisan response, natural disasters are not the time for politics. The only way we get through this is together; and

WHEREAS, these resources also include Public Assistance available through FEMA, which provides aid to local government to fund the repair, restoration, reconstruction, or replacement of public facilities or infrastructure damaged or destroyed by a disaster; and

WHEREAS, a Presidential declaration that a Major Disaster exists in the City of St. Louis may also unlock other forms of federal aid; and

WHEREAS, during the week of May 19, 2025, FEMA, the Missouri State Emergency Management Agency (SEMA), SBA, and local government partnered together to swiftly complete the damage assessment required for FEMA Individual Assistance, and are prepared to swiftly complete the damage assessment required for FEMA Public Assistance the week of May 26, 2025; and

WHEREAS, on May 25, 2025, Missouri Governor Mike Kehoe submitted to FEMA and President Donald J. Trump the Major Disaster Declaration request for the City of St. Louis for Individual Assistance, and has stated he will quickly submit a Major Disaster Request for the City of St. Louis for Public Assistance once that damage assessment is complete; and

WHEREAS, only the President of the United States of America is vested with the authority and power to declare that a Major Disaster exists, and in so doing activate an array of federal programs to assist in the response and recovery effort; and ; and

WHEREAS, President Donald J. Trump, through his national power and influence, is respectfully urged to immediately and fully deploy all federal disaster response resources to aid in the recovery and rebuilding of the St. Louis region.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Aldermen of the City of St. Louis that we pause in our deliberations to stand united with our Senators in requesting federal aid in all of its forms. 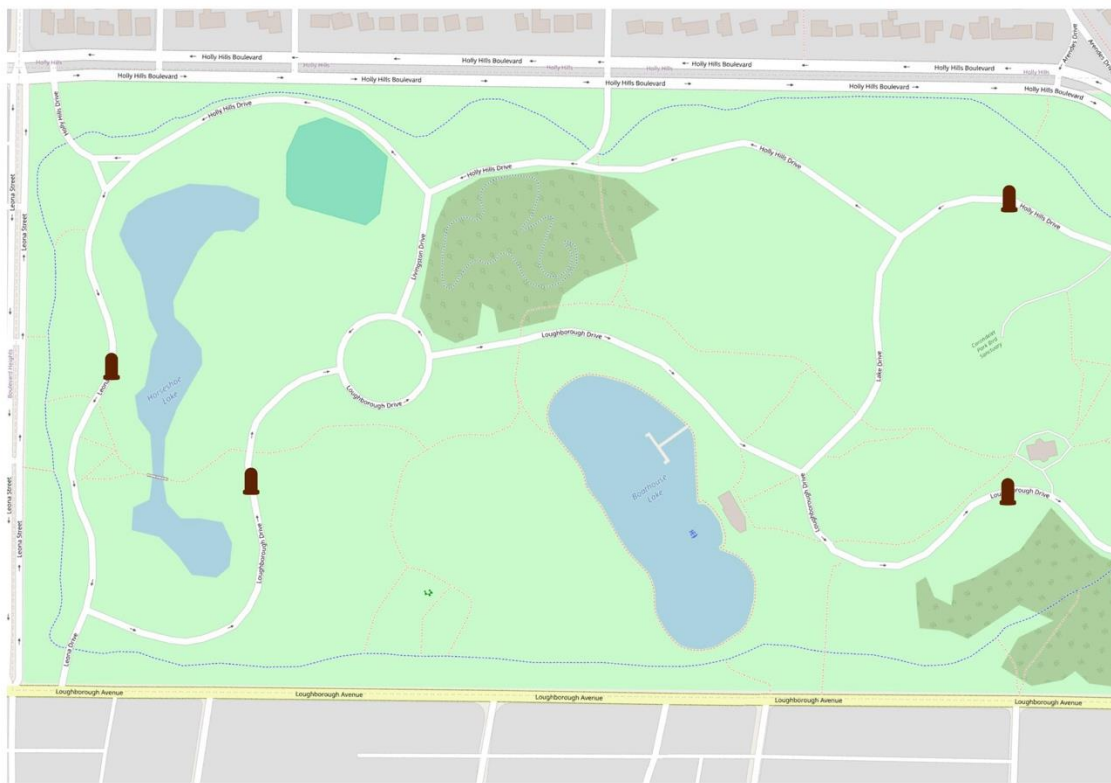
